Political interest on campus is increasing this year as the 2016 presidential election is quickly approaching. Both the Augustana Democrats and the Augustana Republicans have seen growth in their respective clubs.

According to Chairwoman Kylee Kettering, the attendance at Augie Republican monthly meetings and events have jumped from roughly 15 to 20 students last year, to an average of 30 to 35 this year.

Augie Democrat Luke Praeuner has gone to debates hosted by both clubs. "Being around people of the opposite political party helps me to make a more informed decision on whom to vote for next year," he said.

Baily Kramer agreed despite belonging to the Republican Party. "Politics and government affect everyone whether we acknowledge it or not," she said, "and I think everyone should try to stay as informed as they can be."

Putting partisanship aside, both the Augustana Democrats and the Augustana Republicans are glad to see political interest on campus rising.
